

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

The vises and materials were quickly assem-



Pattern of Choice By Lee Weil

I recently received an order for a batch of Moosehead Belles, a streamer pattern created by Gian Padovani, one of the clubs founding fathers. As I set the first hook in my vise I thought about the times we fished with Gian and how many times that particular fly had managed to catch fish when the more conventional patterns had failed. I believe its uniqueness was the key to success.

On one of our trips down to North Carolina, we experienced a stretch of heavy rains and on the last day we headed to the North Mills in search of any water that didn't resemble chocolate milk. When we arrived, the bad news was the water was so muddy you couldn't see your wading boots; the good news was

that there wasn't one other angler on the stretch. But it was the last day and we decided to give it the best shot we could. I stoically tried the common sense silhouette patterns; huge black woolly buggers, black stonefly nymphs and leeches, to no avail. As the rain poured down the back of my neck and off the brim of my cap, I looked at my box for the last fly I would tie on for the Hail Mary play. My eyes fell on the Moosehead Belle and the brilliant red floss looked so bright I couldn't resist the temptation to pluck it out. As I tied it on, I said smiling to myself, "This one's for you Gian", and I fondly thought back to the day when we fished with him on that same river before he passed away.

I made a short cast and fed the line into a sluice under a deadfall, letting it sink as long as possible before beginning the slow, tentative retrieve with as much optimism as I could muster. I felt a hard stop and set the hook to be rewarded with a defiant head shake and a strong run downstream. I worked my way down to the fish and finally brought it to hand under the bridge at the parking area. It was a strong rainbow of 13", and its colors were brilliant against the dark grayness of the day. As I was about to release it, I heard a voice calling me from the bridge above. It was a gray haired gentleman and he was wearing a camera around his neck. My first thought was, "What is this nut doing out here in the pouring rain"? I figured him to be a tourist, looking for a candid shot of another idiot out in the storm. He asked me if I could hold the fish there so he could scale down the bank

to take a picture. I shrugged and agreed, since the fish was quiet and with the 4X tippet there was little danger of breaking off my fly.

He was thrilled and took a couple of shots as I quickly lifted the fish, and then released it. He explained that he was an outdoor columnist for a local paper and had been given an assignment that morning. His story was supposed to be based on the

challenges of fishing in heavy rain and high water. Perfect weather, but he couldn't find anyone who was catching fish and was heading back to his car when he spotted me. He was curious what magic fly I had used to take the fish. I agreed to tell him, but only under the condition that he

give credit to the fly's creator. He said he certainly would, and took my name and address to send me a copy of the article. Jeff showed up then and proceeded to catch a nice brown from under the bridge, which he kindly agreed to lend me to use as a model for another photo. (The photographer seemed to think the female angler theme more effective, I guess.)

We parted ways soon after, but not before taking the time to trade stories about Montana and other various fishing destinations. The gentleman was true to his word and sent along the article, but reported that to his dismay the photos did not come out. It didn't matter; the article was well written and he related the story of how a pattern which originated in Maine, was passed on to members of a Long Island fishing club and then introduced to the mountain streams of North Carolina proved effective on a day when all else failed. Thanks, Gian.

TYING CORNER

Winter Black Stonefly

Stoneflies are prolific insects which are generally available to trout during most seasons of the year. When most other types of flies are dormant and not available, stoneflies can be found in fairly abundant numbers; even during the winter months. If you are very observant, you will see stonefly nymphs clinging

to the tops of submerged rocks, waiting to migrate towards the shore, when weather conditions are right for their emergence.


Stoneflies emerge from the water during different times of the year depending on their individual species. They are a very significant food source for trout, as they are generally much

larger than caddisflies, mayflies, and other prevalent insect species.

Our Fly of the Month, is the Winter Black Stonefly. This pattern is one of my favorite stonefly patterns and comes from the pages of 1000 Flies, one of my favorite fly pattern resource books. The Winter Black Stonefly is very effective during the winter and

early spring months and requires only a minimal amount of fly tying materials as well as fly tying skill.

For the body of this fly use a Tiemco 200R style hook. Although this hook style is primarily used for Stimulator type flies, its long hook shank and curvature makes it an ideal hook for tying any successful stonefly pattern.




Fish this pattern anywhere you have swift water currents. Stoneflies love highly oxygenated water; and successful fly fishers actively look for these areas in which to present their stonefly patterns.

When fishing stonefly patterns, resist the urge to use flawless dry-fly presentation. Remember that stoneflies wiggle and struggle as they make their way fron the river to the bank areas. Present your fly with lots of motion. You can do this by wiggling your rod tip as the fly makes its way downstream. Expert fly fisher Scott Sanchez, describes this practice best by stating that: "Dead-drifting

an adult stonefly works, but using a more active presentation should be an important part of your repertoire. An active presentation imitates both the flight-impaired male running on the surface as well as the fluttering female". Forget about drag-free presentations when using the Winter Black Stonefly.

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


