giving an impromptu presentation at 6:00 on Salt Water Fishing on LI.



This is the first in a series of articles on fishing with the environment in mind. We must all do " a little something" to protect our fishing areas. There are some serious diseases that are affecting our fishing areas in almost every state. The newer threat is "Didymo".

#### Q: What is Didymo?

Didymo, also known as "Rock Snot" is a single-celled, freshwater alga. While the individual cells are invisible to the naked eye, Didymo can form large colonies or mats that attach via a stalk to rocks and plants smothering the bottoms of streams and rivers with a thick yellow/brown layer of growth. The massive blooms can form distinctive flowing 'rats tails' that turn white at their ends and look similar to tissue paper. Since the 1980s, this once rare species has been expanding its geographic range and forming excessive growths covering miles of stream areas.

#### Q: Why is Didymo a problem?

These massive nuisance growths may impact freshwater fish, aquatic plants, and important aquatic insects. Didymo blooms can reduce the amount and availability of suitable habitats. When large mats are present impacts can include: reduced size and density of some larval aquatic insects (caddisflies, stoneflies, and mayflies), increased populations of invertebrates typically associated with degraded stream habitat (midge larvae,

oligochaete worms), a reduction of clean substrate for fish nesting and egg laying, and a decline in large, adult fish.

Economic impacts include fouling of water intakes and, in heavily infested areas. Didymo may be linked to a decline in freshwater angling and related tourism. Impacts to aesthetics are common, with reports of unsightly masses that appear like strands of toilet paper leading to concerns about sanitation and sewer malfunctions. The heavy, slippery brownish mats degrade swimming areas and also foul fishing gear.

#### Q: How does Didymo spread?

Human-assisted movement of Didymo is the most likely culprit in many introductions. Clumps of Didymo as well as single microscopic cells can be moved around by boaters, anglers, hunters and other aquatic recreationists. Didymo, like other aquatic invaders, can be transported on wet felted soles and boots, damp wading gear, and in any standing water associated with boats or other types of gear.

#### WHAT YOU CAN DO:

- 1. <u>SOAK</u> ALL CLOTHING, WADING BOOTS, SANDALS, ETC, IN HOT SOAPY WATER FOR 30 MINUTES.
- 2. <u>WASH</u> ALL HARD SURFACES LIKE TUBES, KAYAKS, AND FISHING GEAR WITH HOT SOAPY WATER AS WELL.
- 3. <u>A 5 % DETERGENT SOLUTION</u> IS EFFECTIVE. USE 3/4 CUPS OF ANY DETERGENT (DISH SOAP, ANTISEPTIC HAND SOAP, OR LAUNDRY DETERGENT) PER GALLON OF HOT TAP WATER TO KILL THE ALGAE.
  - 4. Go on the web and <u>LEARN</u> MORE ABOUT DIDYMO ALGAE.

#### WHEN FISHING don't be LAZY

- USE SOME COMMON SENSE
- CLEAN YOUR EQUIPMENT
- and KEEP ROCK SNOT OUT OF OUR STREAMS

NOTICE(Aug 2007) The invasive freshwater algae didymo was recently confirmed in the BattenKill River(VT, NY), the upper Connecticut River (VT, NH) and in the White River (VT). Trout anglers should be sure to Check, Clean and Dry their waders prior to reuse. Cleaning for 1 minute or longer in hot water (140°F, much longer period required for felt soles) or a weak solution of bleach is most effective.


#### We're Invited...

## MASTER YOUR FLY CASTING.... and have fun doing it.

There are lots of great books, videos, web sites and casting instructors that teach the basics of fly-fishing. The problem is, most hopefuls learn to cast well enough to catch some fish, but many put away that fly rod until the next fishing trip. This could be weeks or months away.

The learned lessons, of casting strokes, timing and narrow loops dissolve into a lazy memory. The answer: Practice.

This holds true not only for novice casters but also intermediate anglers and even experts. Amazingly, the top 10 fly casters in the world practice casting on a continuing basis. I practice casting almost every day for about 15 to 25 minutes. Make practice fun. Casting practice on the lawn or pond soon becomes like playing a game. Many of you will find these games not only fun but perhaps addictive. You may even want to compete in a local tournament for fun. I remember, many years ago we held a contest in distance casting at a picnic. The year was 1996 and I was the winner of that contest.

Remember, the most important ingredient of fly fishing skill is the ability to put the fly exactly where you want to. Master your flycasting and have fun at the same time.


