Don't forget about the photo contest at each meeting. See the rules in the news letter.


We will be starting the fly tying nights again in November, at Pancho's. We did this last year and the people that came thought it was terrific. See me at the meeting for more information.

### Fly of the Month

Bead head patterns have been very popular for the last 10 years or so. Taking the place of lead in many patterns, bead heads have been proven to actually sink faster than lead. Bead patterns work well in either still or moving water. Cast the fly and let it sink a bit before retrieving. Vary the sink time and retrieval until you find the technique that works. You will find that this pattern is very productive.

#### **Materials:**

**Hook**: Mustad 9671, 9672, Tiemco 3761, sizes 8-16


Weight: One bead

**Thread**: Brown, 6/0 or 8/0 **Rib**: Gold or copper wire

Tail and body: Pheasant tail fibers
Wingcase and legs: Pheasant tail fibers

Thorax: Peacock herl

#### **Bead Head Pheasant Tail Nymph**



- 2. Put hook in the vise with the shank pointing down a little so bead stays at the eye.
- 3. Attach wire about mid-shank and hold it as you wrap thread over wire to the bend
- 4. Hold a pheasant tail, and stroke the fibers outward so the tips are even before cutting off the ones you want. Make a shank length tail at the bend by attaching a dozen or so tail fibers by their tips on top of the hook. Keep thread wraps on top of each other
- 5. Hold up butts of pheasant tail fibers and wind thread forward to a little in front of mid shank.
- 6. Grasp the pheasant tail fibers with your fingers and start wrapping them around the shank. The first wrap should be back to cover the thread wraps securing the fibers, and then wrap forward to mid-shank, secure and trim excess.
- 7. Spiral the copper wire rib forward in the opposite direction than you wrapped the pheasant tail fibers. This counter wrapping protects the pheasant tail fibers. Secure and cut off excess wire. Leave thread at front of body.
- 8. Cut off a dozen or so tail fibers after making them even. Measure the tail fibers so the distance from the tips to the thread is about twice the mid-shank-to-bead length. Secure them on top of the hook with tips to rear. Wrap thread over butts to help build up the thorax area. Trim excess.
- 9. Secure two or three peacock herls by their tips between the body and the bead. Wind thread to bead. Build up a fat thorax by winding herls between body and bead. Secure and trim excess.
- 10. Pull the wingcase fibers forward, hold them together and secure with a turn or two of thread.
- 11. Divide the tips, and hold half of them along each side of the thorax. Put on a couple more thread wraps to hold tips back, whip finish behind bead and add a drop of head cement to wraps.

I realize that it's not an ideal time to be indoors tying flies, but for those of you that do, there will be two small preliminary raffle prizes to reward your early efforts (depending on the number of contributing tyers between now and November) besides the Grand prize to be drawn in January. Don't forget; 12 freshwater or 10 saltwater flies gets you a ticket. I will be collecting them every meeting except for August. We need you to help us make for another successful year at the show! #### **GET THAT FLY LINE READY!**

From the newsletter of the Fort Worth Texas Fly Fishers, by Al Crise, The Rod and Reel Doctor

#### It's time to clean your fly lines.

If you have one of those new type lines, the care is easy. (1) Remove the line from the reel and cut off the nail knot. Yes, the nail knot. (2) place the line in a plastic pail or tub to which you add a couple drops of liquid soap (Ivory works good). Fill to half full. (3) Agitate gently for a few minutes (Hum Dixie four times). (4) Pour out soapy water, add fresh water and rinse (for three choruses). (5) Dry by hanging on drying spool or in a net bag but do not tangle. Let the line air dry. (6) when dry, apply a good line dressing per manufacturergs instructions. (7) Retie the nail knot to the line/backing and wind the line back on the reel. This is a good place to store the fly line. (8) Now take the reel and the rod to the closest fishing hole and make sure it works. Enjoy it even more and take someone fly fishing.



Berkley has a program for recycling used fishing line. If you call them and you are a business, they will send you a shipping box (prepaid) to send in the line. Their only stipulation is that the line be

clean and free of all debris, hooks, and metal attachments. Here's the number for Berkley:

1-800-BERKLEY or (712) 336-1520.

If you are not a business and you have a bag of line, send it to the following address. Remember that birds and marine animals become entangled in fishing line. Do what you can. Make sure the line is clean of debris, hooks, and metal attachments. Berkley **recycles** the line into artificial fishing structures.


